"Our primary fundraising goal is to fund our trip to the National DECA Competition," said Annika Rapp, President of the BIT Business Guild. "This year, the Nationals are in Atlanta, Georgia. We love the tough competition but it is also a great opportunity to meet other Collegiate DECA students from across the country."

The Collegiate Distributive Educational Clubs of America (DECA) prepares emerging leaders and entrepreneurs in marketing, finance, hospitality and management. The national competition pitts student teams in these business areas. Currently there are more than 15,000 college students from across the world who are DECA members.

Montana Tech was the first Montana college with Collegiate DECA competitors. The Business Guild was created to be a space for students to expand their business education and experience. Members have the opportunity to develop skills such as researching, team-building, presenting, and strategizing. The Guild offers free consultation to entrepreneurs and small business owners in the Butte community.

Regarding the fundraiser, this is the 32<sup>nd</sup> year which the Society for Professonal Engineers have sponsored this annual fundraising event which attracts other Tech student clubs as well as vendors from across the state.

The keynote speaker for the event was Dr. Jonathan Griffin. His lecture connected both in person and via distance students, academics, and industry professionals. Dr. Griffin led a lively discussion on the current issues and trends in health information technology.

Current issues and trends included health information exchange and the efficient and effective use of patient data to make needed improvements in our health care system.

Dr. Griffin is the Chief **Medical Innovation Officer** at St. Peter's Health. He received his doctorate and masters of health administration from the University of Washington and completed residency at the Family Medicine of Residency of Idaho Rural Training Program.

Dr. Griffin has been practicing medicine for In his talk, he indicated that nine years in addition to serving on both hospital system and health insurance plan leadership teams.

He was a physician champion for Montana's first HIE, HealthShare Montana, and has helped spearhead efforts to reestablish a statewide HIE since March 2015.

Dr. Griffin currently maintains a private practice, he serves as medical director of innovation and technology at St. Peter's Health, he is medical director of five skilled nursing facilities, and served as past-President of the Montana Medical Association.

### BIT Speaker Series - CEO of Lonewolf Energy

Trent Sizemore, Founder and CEO of Lonewolf Energy, Inc., spoke at Montana Tech to 65 students on Tuesday, December 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Poore Room of the University Relations Building as part of the Business & Information Systems Department Speaker Series.

Mr. Sizemore spoke about his career as a Professional Landman and as a Montana oil and gas operator and producer.

Headquartered in Billings he has worked all over the U.S. As Montana Tech and the Business & Information Technology Department have recently created and developed the Professional Landman Certificate Program, Mr. Sizemore's lecture was both timely and highly anticipated.

"We are truly honored to have Mr. Sizemore speak here at Tech," said John Belland, President of the Student Association of Professional Landmen. "As students who are studying for careers as Professional Landmen, Mr. Sizemore is an ideal role model for us to see what can be accomplished both as a landman and as an entrepreneur in the oil and gas industries."

Mr. Sizemore joined the professional landman ranks in 1981. He is a member of both the American Association of Professional Landmen (AAPL) and the Montana Association of Professional Landmen. In addition to his years of success as a Professional Landman, Mr. Sizemore expanded into oil and gas operations and production with a variety

of acquisitions of oil & gas producing assets and facilities, focused in Blaine & Hill Counties and North-Central Montana.
